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History of the Sainte-Barbe Hôtel & Spa – MGallery Collection

Perched at the entrance to the port of Le Conquet, between the Kermorvan Peninsula and the Pointe du Renard, the Sainte-Barbe Hôtel boasts a rich and fascinating history. The original building, constructed in the 18th century, was a modest military house strategically positioned at the tip of Finistère and used by the French Navy.

Overlooking the Iroise Sea, the building offers a breathtaking view of the Breton islands of Quéménès, Béniguet, Molène, and Ouessant. A silent witness to changing times, it has managed to retain its authentic charm and distinctive maritime character.

In 1891, Guillaume Quiniou purchased the property and transformed it into an inn, providing a welcoming refuge for sailors and travelers drawn to the wild beauty of the Breton coast. Over the decades, the inn changed hands several times, yet its spirit of hospitality remained constant.

Between the First World War and the 1970s, the establishment underwent two major phases of expansion—first outward on both sides, then toward the sea. In 1990, architect Philippe Jean embarked on a bold new extension, projecting a concrete structure out over the ocean. The project sparked heated debate among locals, some of whom felt it clashed with the traditional landscape.

The hotel closed in 2006 due to the absence of a buyer. A real estate project emerged in 2008, but the global financial crisis prevented its completion. It wasn't until 2013 that two Breton entrepreneurs, Guy Diquelou and Jean-Marie Chapalain, recognized the site's potential and decided to acquire it. Three years of planning were followed by another three years of construction, once again entrusted to architect Philippe Jean to ensure continuity with his 1990s extension.

Now fully renovated and enhanced, the Sainte-Barbe officially reopened its doors in May 2019, once again welcoming guests. With its distinctive architecture—a long-time subject of discussion in Le Conquet—the hotel has become a true landmark on the coastline. Its 360-degree exposure offers guests an exceptional panoramic view over the Iroise Sea and its islands.

The name "Sainte-Barbe" pays tribute to the patron saint of mariners, highlighting the deep connection between the establishment and the maritime history of the region.

Today, the Sainte-Barbe Hôtel features 34 rooms, two panoramic bars—"La Rotonde" and "Le Rooftop"—a restaurant called "La Corniche", and a Marine Spa, all open year-round to provide a unique experience between land and sea.

Located in Le Conquet, a charming town of 2,800 residents just 30 minutes from Brest, the hotel blends seamlessly into an authentic setting marked by fishing traditions and the rugged beauty of the Breton coast. Crossed by the GR34 coastal trail and situated on the Lighthouse Route, Le Conquet is a favorite stop for sailors, hikers, and travelers seeking a change of scenery.




Visit to Pointe Saint-Mathieu



At the heart of the Lighthouse Route

The highest concentration of lighthouses in the world can be found in the Iroise Sea, so let yourself be guided!

• The Saint-Mathieu lighthouse



The Pointe Saint-Mathieu lighthouse dominates the Atlantic Ocean with its imposing silhouette. Built in the 19th century, this emblematic lighthouse is part of an exceptional site, with its steep cliffs and sea views. As well as its maritime function, the lighthouse is also steeped in history, with the ruins of a medieval abbey adding to the landscape. From its platform, you can admire the vast expanse of sea and, on a clear day, see the Molène archipelago. It's a must-see for lovers of nature, history and grandiose landscapes, offering a breathtaking spectacle on every visit.

Lighthouse at sea The lighthouse of the black stones

Off the coast of Pointe Saint-Mathieu, the Pierres Noires lighthouse has stood watch for 150 years. Visible from the mainland, it reveals the secrets of its construction during sea tours.



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• Kermorvan lighthouse

You should see how the locals talk about it! "Walking to the Kermorvan lighthouse is already a bit like taking to the open sea. The Presqu'île juts out into the sea, offering magnificent views of the Molène archipelago, the Blancs Sablons cove, the port of Le Conquet and its ria. The lighthouse stands guard at the end of a rocky point washed by the currents. When I get there, I feel like I'm on the bow of a ship! Laura, conquétoise.

• The Trezien lighthouse



The Trezien lighthouse is an iconic lighthouse that watches over the rough waters of the Iroise Sea. Built in the 19th century, it stands proudly a few kilometres from the tip of Île-Molène, offering an uninterrupted view of the wild landscapes of Brittany. It is the highest lighthouse on the Iroise. As well as its maritime function, the area around the lighthouse is a haven of peace, with its moorland and steep coastline ideal for walkers.

BREST

Nicknamed the 'City of the Ponant', Brest is one of Europe's maritime capitals and, above all, one of France's most beautiful harbours.

Always open to the world, thanks to its large military and commercial port, Brest has a rich and turbulent history. The only remaining reminders of its past are its castle. Unfortunately, the town suffered the disasters of the Second World War.

• The National Maritime Museum

IHoused in the Château de Brest, just off the city centre, the museum is dedicated to the great adventure of the Brest Arsenal and the French Navy. You'll find many sculptures, paintings, objects and equipment dedicated to the navy, even today. The museum's exterior is just as impressive, as it is housed inside an old fortified castle, a mythical fortress dating from the Middle Ages, similar to the one found in Southern Burgundy. For the record, this famous castle is one of the monuments that survived the 1944 bombing raids that ravaged Brest during the Second World War.

Visit Océanopolis, the National Centre for Scientific Culture dedicated to the Ocean, one of France's largest aquariums in Brittany! Its faithfully recreated aquariums are among the finest in France. Discover numerous species, both rare and common: invertebrates, fish, marine mammals... and enjoy a captivating experience of the aquatic world.



BREST

• L'atelier des Capucins

Les ateliers des Capucins in Brest is a must for lovers of culture and innovation. Formerly an industrial site devoted to shipbuilding, this space has been completely renovated to become a centre for creation and culture. Today, the Atelier des Capucins hosts exhibitions, artistic events and collaborative projects, while offering spectacular views over the city and its port. This dynamic, modern venue also houses a media library, a virtual reality centre and various spaces for creativity and innovation. It's a place where industrial history meets contemporary art, perfect for an enriching and original visit when you're in Brest.

• Other ideas for discovering the Cité du Ponant

The Parc de la Penfeld is a pleasant place for a stroll along the water's edge. The Port de Commerce area is a lively place with cafés, restaurants and a beautiful view of the port. You can also explore the Explorers' Garden, a green space with a view over the city. The Musée des Beaux-Arts displays a variety of works of art, while the historic Tour Tanguy offers an interesting view of Brest.

If you're in town during the summer, the Plage du Moulin Blanc is a great place to enjoy the water and sand. Breton specialities such as crêpes and cider can be enjoyed in local restaurants.



• The Museum of the memory of 39-45

This museum plunges you into the key events of the Second World War, with a particular focus on local stories and objects bearing witness to daily life during the war. The museum houses an impressive collection of objects, photos and documents from the period that will give you a better understanding of the historical context of Le Conquet and the surrounding area during the years 1939-1945. You'll discover poignant eyewitness accounts, exhibitions on resistance fighters, soldiers and the life of local residents during the occupation, as well as authentic reconstructions.
